Stanley Bernard Silverman, 88, passed away on June 6. Graveside services and burial will be at 1:00pm Sunday, June 10, 2018 at Mt. Carmel Cemetery, 5529 Ditzler, Raytown, MO 64133. In lieu of flowers, the family requests contributions to the Jewish Community Center Heritage Center.

He was a lifelong area resident and a graduate of Central High School.

Stan was born in 1929 and after serving in the Korean War, he established a career as a salesman.

He is survived by his wife, Rosemary Yarmo Silverman. He also leaves two sisters, Dorothy Kaufman and Miriam Birnbaum, both of Kansas City. He was predeceased by his sister Shirley Springer of Arlington, Virginia.

Stan leaves his sons Steven Silverman (Shelly) of Tucson, Arizona, and Michael Silverman (Laura Sherman) of Boston, Massachusetts, and stepchildren James Yarmo, Claire Yarmo and Sherri Katz. He leaves 12 grandchildren and six great-grandchildren.

He was a member of the ROMEO's, and had a very long-standing weekly lunch with his closest friends, Leibert Birnbaum and Victor Cascio.
